Trinity Bookstore

Located at the entrance of the campus, the Trinity Bookstore has become one of the largest general Christian bookstores in northern Illinois and is open to the public. It offers a wide selection of Christian books, music, gifts, greetings cards, and "Trinity" merchandise as well as all of the required and supplemental textbooks and materials needed for course work. It maintains a wide selection of theological resources including Bible software. Students in degree programs may purchase a wide range of general software packages at academic pricing. Trinity has a "break even" policy on the sale of textbooks, course materials, general books, Bibles, and software to students, so students receive a discount on most purchases.

Special sales are offered several times a year to encourage students to build their libraries and ministry resources, an investment which will provide rich benefits both now and in the years after graduation. Alumni continue to receive their student discount privileges and occasionally receive special sale offers. The bookstore staff is committed to giving courteous, personal, prompt, and informed service to each of its customers. Maintenance Services

The services provided by the staff of the Physical Plant assure that the Trinity campus remains a well-functioning, clean and safe environment. The Physical Plant is responsible for the repair and custodial maintenance of the buildings and grounds. If there is a need for maintenance work in campus facilities, please submit your request to your Resident Assistant or the Student Services Office. Emergencies such as power outages and flooding should be reported directly by either calling x7134 during business hours or Security at x6400 after regular hours. The Physical Plant is located in the Institutional Services office building.

Graphic Communications and Print Shop

The graphic department and print shop are located at the north end of the Aldeen building. They provide convenient color and black & white printing, high-speed copying (including theses, dissertations, overheads, and resumes), color copies and prints, and graphic design at reasonable cost to students, staff, and faculty.

Mail Services

The Mail Services department is located in the northwest corner of the Aldeen building. Upon beginning studies at Trinity, students will be assigned an on-campus mailbox. Incoming mail, returned class materials, and campus flyers will be deposited in this box for pickup. Outgoing mail may be deposited either in the mail boxes in the lower level of the chapel, the U.S. Postal Service mailbox located near the Mansion, or at Mail Services. Students may purchase postage as well as register, insure, certify, and express mail items through this office.

Placement

Through the efforts of the Placement Office, the legacy of students going on into fruitful professional ministry situations continues. Whether in churches or other Christian organizations, graduating students will receive assistance in securing positions for future ministry and employment.

Students in the Master of Divinity program and the Master of Arts program with a concentration in educational ministries, youth ministry, and children's ministry are encouraged to register with the Placement Office. To utilize Trinity's placement resources, students are strongly encouraged to take PT 670, Seminar for Placement, which will provide the best placement assistance.

Trinity makes every effort to serve all denominations as effectively as possible. Numerous churches from a variety of denominations contact TEDS each year to assist them in securing graduates for available ministry positions. Representatives from many churches make on-campus visits for this very purpose, as do the district superintendents of the EFCA. The Placement Office has been very successful in securing placement after seminary. Most MDiv students who have sought assistance from the Placement Office find positions within six months following graduation.

The Master of Theology Program

Overview of the Master of Theology Program

Purposes of the Program

The Master of Theology (ThM) program is designed for students who have earned the three-year Master of Divinity after having earned a four-year undergraduate bachelor's degree. The Master of Theology program allows a student to concentrate on course work in one field of specialization, developing a high level of competency in that area. This program is well-suited for those who wish to teach, pursue

doctoral studies, develop more finely-tuned ministry skills, or further their biblical/theological understanding.

You can complete this program in one year of study, and you will have the option of writing an acceptable thesis, or submitting two major research papers as part of two advanced courses in your program.

Admission Requirements

In addition to the admission requirements described in "Admissions":

1. You must have earned a Master of Divinity from an accredited seminary.
2. You must have achieved a minimum grade point average of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale for all graduate theological studies.

Candidacy Requirements

Admission to the Master of Theology program does not guarantee acceptance into candidacy for the degree. You will be recognized as a candidate for the degree only after you complete a minimum of eight (8) semester hours of study at Trinity with a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 (on a 4.0 scale), and remove any entrance deficiencies for the Master of Theology program. You must have demonstrated proficiency in the area of concentration and supporting fields, and must give adequate proof of ability to successfully complete degree requirements.

Residency Requirements

The 24 hours of the Master of Theology degree must be taken on the Deerfield campus of Trinity Evangelical Divinity School.

Graduation Requirements

You must complete the following requirements in order to earn the Master of Theology degree:

1. Complete the general requirements for graduates from Trinity as outlined under "General Graduation Requirements."
2. Complete at least 24 semester hours of advanced courses, including Theological Research Methods (___ 710), but excluding core Master of Divinity courses. Students with a concentration in Pastoral Counseling and Psychology will be required to take PC 705 Psychological Research Methods rather than Theological Research Methods (___710). Unless otherwise indicated in the description of the respective concentrations, all courses are to be taken in the area of concentration to which you have been admitted. The courses will normally be at the level represented by the 700–849 series of numbers, with any exceptions to be approved in writing by the chairperson of the department of concentration. Such course work is to be done in resident study in the degree program, with a minimum cumulative grade point average of 3.0 (on a 4.0 scale), with no grade below a "C-" counting toward the degree.
3. Complete one of the following:
 - a) Research and write a competent thesis on an approved subject which gives evidence of your ability to do creative thinking and independent research, and which presupposes an ability to use the original languages of Scripture. The thesis will also need to show competence in modern foreign languages when, in the opinion of your thesis committee, such materials are pertinent to the thesis topic.
 - b) As an alternative to the thesis you may write two major research papers, done as a part of two advanced courses in the program, giving evidence of competencies similar to those demonstrated in the thesis. Before selecting this alternative, you should secure from the Records Office a copy of the "Prospectus for the Major Research Paper in the ThM Non-thesis Option."
4. Successfully demonstrate competency in the area of concentration by an examination, the mode and criteria to be determined by the department.
5. Complete at least two semesters of Field Education. Students with significant prior ministry experience should inquire at the Field Education Office regarding procedures for waiving Field Education.
