Course Description

Someone once said that the Gospel of John is both shallow enough for a child to wade in and deep enough for an elephant to swim in. This biblical book is remarkable for its ability to explain deep theological concepts in simple terms. At the same time, knowledge of its historical, literary, social, and theological background will help students go deeper in their understanding of Jesus, the gospel, Christian theology, and Christian ministry. This course is designed to give that background knowledge along with the tools for studying Scripture at a deeper level in order to help students apply the gospel more powerfully to life and to the church today.

Course Objectives

By the end of this course the student should:

- 1. have a greater *love for Jesus* and *passion for his Word*;
- 2. know the background, purpose, structure, contents, theology, and themes of *the Gospel of John*;
- 3. be equipped to *interpret Scripture* in its historical, literary, and theological contexts; and
- 4. be able to *apply Scripture* in a 21st-century context.

Course Requirements

- 1. <u>Attendance, Preparation, and Participation</u> (30%) Students are expected to come to class having completed the assigned readings and to participate in discussions in a manner that demonstrates a thorough knowledge of the readings. Students who miss class time or who are unfamiliar with ideas in the readings cannot get an A on this portion of their grade. A reading log is provided at the back of the syllabus for students to track their reading. Note that there is **168 pages of reading that needs to be done before our first class meeting**.
- 2. <u>Word Study</u> (15%) Following the methods explained in Chapters 9-10 of *Interpreting the Gospel of John* and discussed in class, do a word study of a key word in the Gospel of John. Notify the professor beforehand which word you will study. The word study should include a printout of all the occurrences of a word/phrase and comments on how your reading of one particular passage is affected by the other occurrences of the word/phrase. A sample will be given the first week of class. *Due the second weekend*.
- 3. <u>Exegetical Paper and Presentation</u> (35%) –Write an 8-to-10-page exegetical paper on a passage in the Gospel of John and lead the class in a teaching on that passage. *Due the third weekend.* Details will be given on the first day of class.
- 4. <u>Topical Paper</u> (20%) Choose a topic related to the Gospel of John as a whole and write a 5-page paper. The paper could be a theological reflection (e.g., what modern theologies of the Holy Spirit could learn from the Gospel of John) or more practical reflection (e.g., how my church could live more missionally in the light of the Gospel of John). *Due the final weekend*.

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Class Attendance

Students are required to attend **each and every** session throughout the entire course period. Due to the nature of Extension classes, attendance at all sessions is especially important with weekend courses. Missing even an hour of a weekend class means a significant portion of the

required contact with the instructor and learning community has been lost. For this reason, students missing any portion (hours) of an Extension course can result in a grade reduction; missing more than one weekend class session **will** result in a grade reduction and possibly **failing** the course.

In the case of **extreme** emergency or unforeseen circumstances (family emergencies, death, etc.) the student should contact the instructor and secure the necessary permission to miss time in a class and make up the missed class time and assignments. Vacations, ministry responsibilities and travel plans are not considered emergencies and such requests will be denied. As the schedule for the Extension courses is set ahead of time, students should plan ahead to be sure they will be able to make it to all class sessions before they register. If the emergency necessitates a longer absence the student should contact the Dean of Students to request an extension of time, or in rare instances a withdrawal from the class without penalty.
