COVID-19 ADJUSTMENTS

In light of the COVID situation and to maximize pedagogical effectiveness this course will be a hybrid course—i.e., a course with intentional in-class and online components (some in-class components will be replaced by online components). As such there will be heavy use of Moodle, Zoom, and gathering in the physical or online "classroom" for synchronous experiences.

Philosophically, I believe learning best happens in community, and one objective of this course is community-building with collegial interaction; therefore the course will <u>not</u> be recorded and you will need to be present synchronously (whether through Zoom or in person) to participate.

Set aside the posted class time; however, within these hours some sessions will include lectures/narrated PowerPoints to be viewed <u>prior</u> to class time with class time devoted to discussion, some sessions may involve independent study/research, others small group engagements and/or presentations, etc. These are designed to reduce Zoom fatigue while ensuring pedagogical integrity.

As of this date (11/23/20) it appears travel to Ohio from Chicago is not advisable. Our initial plan will largely be for participants to watch pre-recorded lecture/narrated PowerPoints <u>prior</u> to class time each weekend with regular class time devoted to discussion. To this end, the videos for the first weekend (Jan 8-9) will be posted prior to Jan 1 for your review <u>before</u> our Jan 8 class meeting time, with a compensatory reduction of meeting time. Depending on COVID in the Spring semester a later weekend might be fully in person.

A more detailed syllabus will be available before Christmas.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

EM 5210 will consider the nature and responsibilities of leadership for church and Christian ministry organizations. Case studies will be used to assist participants in applying leadership theory to practice. *Three semester hours*. (Catalog)

Further: Subjects on the docket for inclusion: history of leadership theory, biblical leadership, character and spiritual life of the leader, seasons of a leader's life, organizational systems and leadership, working with teams, communication and conflict, power, resilience, administration and management, success and failure, developing the next generation. Time obviously will not permit an in-depth analysis of all these subjects; however, they will each be touched on as the semester progresses. The subject content in this class will not repeat the one hour of leadership content in the EM 5100 Educational Ministries and Leadership course.

TEACHING OBJECTIVES

The course facilitator will:

- Describe various approaches to leadership and leadership challenges
- Examine leadership using a biblical and theological framework
- Encourage active engagement of learners in class discussions
- Demonstrate the critical need for leaders with Christian character
- Use case study methods to assist participants in applying theory to practice
- Provide resources for further study

ANTICIPATED OUTCOMES

Participants will:

- Develop an understanding of the use of a biblical and theological framework when considering leadership
- Garner a fresh appreciation for the service of ministry in the body of Christ
- Critique one's personal character as a leader
- Learn how to use case studies for problem solving
- Develop and implement a plan for personal Christian leadership formation

COURSE READINGS

Course readings should be completed in a thorough fashion enabling participants to critique, discuss, and present the materials read. All readings should be thoroughly covered, but not every word must be read.
